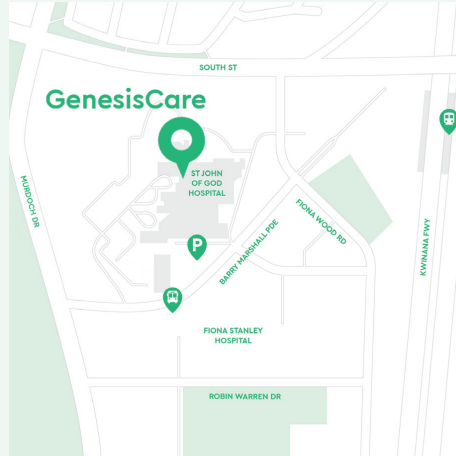

## Patient prep instructions

### To prepare for a CTCA you need to:

- Do not have any stimulants including caffeine (coffee, decaffeinated coffee, tea, chocolate, sports drinks) for 12 hours prior
- If possible bring a friend or family member – someone to support you before, during and after your procedure
- You will have a cannula (small tube) inserted in a vein (usually in your arm)
- You may be given a medication to slow your heart rate, as image quality is higher when your heart rate is low

### What happens during a CTCA:

- You'll be taken into the procedure room and asked to wear a hospital gown
- You'll then lie on a CT scanning bed that slides under the CT machine
- A heart monitor will be used during the CT to watch your heart rate and rhythm
- X-ray dye will be injected into the cannula

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
